n November 8, a team of three left Cleveland, Tennessee, for the little community of Iyanbito, New Mexico. Johnny Hughes, Rock Slaughter, and Brent Heath met Pastor Mark Thomas and other members of the Gospel Lighthouse Church to assist them in laying new carpet in their sanctuary. This would be a quick trip to Navajo Nation, with two days spent laying the carpet and Sunday worship services. We were blessed to fellowship with the congregation each day and observe the love for God that they hold in their heart. Sunday services were powerful, with many experiencing an real encounter with the Holy Spirit, bodies physically healed and spiritually delivered from the bondages of sin.



# Bring on the Heat

ne of the highlights for many of our IMNA volunteers is the annual wood-splitting trip to Cherokee, North Carolina. Each Fall and Winter, teams of volunteers partner with IMNA to assist the Cherokee Family Support Services. The teams spend three days splitting loads of firewood for the tribal elders, low-income families, and special needs families. IMNA is honored to have the Western North Carolina Church of God State Offices come alongside to assist this outreach.

This past October, a team from the Summit Church, Pigeon Forge, Tennessee, worked to make sure that there were approximately 100 loads split and ready for delivery. In January, a team from Community Family Church, Independence, KY, joined the team from Summit Church to once again "bust" approximately 100 loads of firewood to help supply the families to the end of the season.

The families sign up to receive the free wood and can request a load every two weeks. Delivery begins Oct. 1 and runs through April 1; however, elders may request through May 1, if needed. If you are interested in becoming a part of this mission, contact the IMNA offices at 423.479.3831 or email:


