TRIBUTE TO REV. DOUGLAS CLINE

Bishop Douglas Cline passed away in November, as he prepared to enjoy a hunting trip. Doug was used of God to make a most remarkable impact in ministry to the Native Americans, especially when he served for 20 years as the Overseer of the Southwest Indian Ministries, Gallup, New Mexico.

In January 1998, at the Church of God overseers meeting in Cleveland, TN, I was talking with my friend, Rev. Douglas Slocumb about our ministry to Native Americans. He then introduced me to Douglas Cline.

After the introduction, Bro. Cline and I sat and discussed our mutual interest of working with the Native Americans. He then invited me to fly to Gallup and spend time observing the work of SWIM and ministering in several of the Navajo churches.


Doug and his wife, Linda, were true friends to the Native people. They were always ready and willing to go the extra mile to facilitate anyone who was interested in winning them to Christ. Doug was a true friend to IMNA and instrumental in helping us become more involved with tribes of the Southwest.

He is a friend that we are truly going to miss. We will miss the smile that he always had when talking about our work. Our prayers continue to go out to the family. Doug, we look forward to seeing you again.

Doug's life was miraculous, full, and blessed. When he was told he wouldn't live past the age of eleven, God healed his heart condition. In return, Doug lived his life to the fullest; personifying what it meant to live each moment Christ-like, with purpose and intention to change lives for the better. Everywhere he went, he planted the seeds of Christ's love, and he touched lives in ways that defy explanation. Throughout his life, he played in the National Little League Baseball Championship in Cincinnati, OH., and he was an honored veteran of the United States Air Force, having served in Europe and Vietnam. He also became a fastpitched softball champion, and trained to become a world-class boxing champion. While still serving in the military, he built two churches outside his military base in France. He spent 20 years working with the SW Indian Ministries for the Church of God, and helped build 57 worship centers on the Navajo Reservation in New Mexico and Arizona, where he was adopted into the Navajo Nation. He ministered at seven churches in OH and WV, worked as a coal miner in Logan County, WV, trained new ministers, coordinated youth camps, refurbished guns, collected knives, fished, camped, hiked, and gardened. When God called him home, he was pastoring a church plant in Rolla, MO, but most of all, he loved his family, who were the greatest blessings in his life.

Smilling Faces, Happy Hearts

Christmas 2016 marked the 13th year that Indian Ministries of North America has conducted a Christmas Celebration in the town of Hammon,

Oklahoma. IMNA established the Grace Point Ministry Center in the town of Hammon and are continuing to minister to the children and families in the community. The annual Christmas Celebration has become one of the highlights of the year among the Cheyenne / Arapaho people living there.

For the last two years, the Saturday morning of the event, everyone in town awakes to the smell of barbeque chicken in the smoker. A group of volunteers, from Mena, Arkansas, travel to Hammon to prepare meals for the community and assist with the gift distribution. This year we served over 150 people and another 100 plates home for families to enjoy. John Stubbs commented, "It was exciting to be able to partner with IMNA and see God use those who participated. From giving gifts, to cooking and serving the guests, it was a great experience for our church to be able to share the love of Jesus Christ."

The event began with a worship service on Friday night, followed by a distribution of clothing and household items. Then, on Saturday, lunch was prepared and served to the community, and then toys, educational material and other gifts were given to the children, along with family gifts for the parents and grandparents.

"We met their needs physically, by feeding them, spiritually with the Word and hope with the gifts," stated Sonja Stubbs.





From the very onset, you could witness the care that people had for one another, as they waited patiently in line while the elders were served their meal first.




